

SCRIPTURE LESSON: Joshua 3:7-17

⁷The LORD said to Joshua, "Today I will begin to make you great in the opinion of all Israel. Then they will know that I will be with you in the same way that I was with Moses. ⁸ You are to command the priests who carry the covenant chest, 'As soon as you come to the bank of the Jordan, stand still in the Jordan.'"

⁹ Joshua said to the Israelites, "Come close. Listen to the words of the LORD your God." 10 Then Joshua said, "This is how you will know that the living God is among you and will completely remove the Canaanites, and all the others who stand before you. 11 Look! The covenant chest of the ruler of the entire earth is going to cross over in front of you in the Jordan. 12 Now pick twelve men from the tribes of Israel, one per tribe. ¹³ The soles of the priests' feet, who are carrying the chest of the LORD, ruler of the whole earth, will come to rest in the water of the Jordan. At that moment, the water of the Jordan will be cut off. The water flowing downstream will stand still in a single heap."

Marching across the Jordan

¹⁴ The people marched out from their tents to cross over the Jordan. The priests carrying the covenant chest were in front of the people. ¹⁵ When the priests who were carrying the chest came to the Jordan, their feet touched the edge of the water. The Jordan had overflowed its banks completely, the way it does during the entire harvest

season. ¹⁶ But at that moment the water of the Jordan coming downstream stood still. It rose up as a single heap very far off, just below Adam, which is the city next to Zarethan. The water going down to the desert sea (that is, the Dead Sea) was cut off completely. The people crossed opposite Jericho. ¹⁷ So the priests carrying the LORD's covenant chest stood firmly on dry land in the middle of the Jordan. Meanwhile, all Israel crossed over on dry land, until the entire nation finished crossing over the Jordan.

⁹ You remember, brothers and sisters, our efforts and hard work. We preached God's good news to you, while we worked night and day so we wouldn't be a burden on any of you. ¹⁰ You and God are witnesses of how holy, just, and blameless we were toward you believers. ¹¹ Likewise, you know how we treated each of you like a father treats his own children. ¹² We appealed to you, encouraged you, and pleaded with you to live lives worthy of the God who is calling you into his own kingdom and glory.

How the Thessalonians received God's message

¹³ We also thank God constantly for this: when you accepted God's word that you heard from us, you welcomed it for what

it truly is. Instead of accepting it as a human message, you accepted it as God's message, and it continues to work in you who are believers.

*GOSPEL LESSON: Matthew 23:1-12 Ways of the legal experts and the Pharisees

23 Then Jesus spoke to the crowds and his disciples, ² "The legal experts and the Pharisees sit on Moses' seat. ³ Therefore. you must take care to do everything they say. But don't do what they do. 4 For they tie together heavy packs that are impossible to carry. They put them on the shoulders of others, but are unwilling to lift a finger to move them. ⁵ Everything they do, they do to be noticed by others. They make extra-wide prayer bands for their arms and long tassels for their clothes. ⁶ They love to sit in places of honor at banquets and in the synagogues. ⁷ They love to be greeted with honor in the markets and to be addressed as 'Rabbi.'

⁸ "But you shouldn't be called *Rabbi*, because you have one teacher, and all of you are brothers and sisters. ⁹ Don't call anybody on earth your father, because you have one Father, who is heavenly. ¹⁰ Don't be called *teacher*, because Christ is your one teacher. ¹¹ But the one who is greatest among you will be your servant. ¹² All who lift themselves up will be brought low. But all who make themselves low will be lifted up.

These are the ancient words

revealed to us anew. Thanks be to God, Amen.

MESSAGE: "Burdens"

A few months ago I decided that I wanted to sew a dress for my granddaughter. My mother used to make a quilt for each of the grand-children. I don't know how to quilt, so I thought a cute dress for each of the girls would be something they would remember from me. After all, I learned to sew in the Girl Scouts and in Home Ec many years ago. However, since I moved recently, I have no supplies so I went to a store to get help from experts.

The very nice lady at the store was good at her job. She reminded me of every step in the process as we filled up my cart. We found a pattern, some fabric and matching thread. Of course, I also needed shears, pins, a pin cushion, needles, marking chalk, and an iron and ironing board to keep the wrinkles out as I worked. And then I also needed a portable sewing machine, bobbins and all that goes with it. My cart overflowed and it was heavy. When I paid for everything and started to lug this heavy pack to my car, I thanked her for her knowledge and expertise. I said to her, "I bet you have sewn some beautiful garments." She looked at me and said, "Are you kidding me? I don't sew anything. I go buy everything I need from ready-wear at Walmart. It's easier and faster."

I think it was a case of "do as I say, not as I do." That's exactly how I would describe Pharisees and scribes.

With this new chapter we are launched into the last of the five great blocks of teaching in the Gospel of Matthew. These blocks were constructed by the author of Matthew as the backbone of his gospel.

The Sermon on the Mount came first, then the commissioning of the disciples. Then the parables of the kingdom and the material on living in community in obedience to Jesus' teaching. As we begin chapter 23, we have another long, final block of teaching, balancing the Sermon on the Mount as we look ahead to the future and warning of what is to come.

In all of this, Matthew is saying, we are to regard Jesus as being like Moses, only more so. Moses, they believed, gave the people the five books of the law; Jesus gives them the five books of the new covenant, the new relationship between God and the world. Moses brought the people through the desert and led them to the point where they were ready to cross over the Jordan and go into the promised land. Jesus is leading his people through the desert to the point where he will lead them through death itself and on into the new world which God is going to make. Only, unlike Moses, he won't stay on this side of the river, leaving someone else to take the people across. He will go ahead, like his namesake Joshua, and lead them himself into the new world.

And now he finds himself surrounded with people who are telling fellow Jews about the heavy packs they need to carry on their back for the journey – but who never dream of carrying such things themselves. These legal experts, who are always going on about Moses: Moses said this, and Moses said that, do this, don't do that, watch out for this danger, remember to do this every day, and so on and on. From one point of view it looks like wonderful devotion, a lavish attention to the detail of the commandments which God gave to Israel. But from another point of view it looks like a saleslady telling a novice to sewing all the things she should carry, but never venturing to the sewing machine herself.

Jesus' charge against the scribes and Pharisees, which builds up through this chapter as a devastating catalogue of indictments, is not that they were wrong to pay attention to Moses. Matthew has made it clear all along that the Mosaic law, the Torah, was good and God-given. It should be observed. But what really mattered in it, as he said in chapter 22:37-39, were the big central matters loving God and loving your neighbor, which means justice and mercy and faithfulness. When it came to those, Jesus declared the legal experts who were so good at telling other people what to do but never lifted a finger to move the really heavy burdens.

Instead, they concentrated on outward show; how long the fringes on their prayer shawls were, how pious and

loud were their prayers, their titles f honor and places of honor, all the fame that a small society could afford. Jesus throws it all to the winds. It shows they haven't understood what Moses was all about. As I see it, their noses were so high in the air, they could trip over the "little people".

What about in our world today? I'm sure we could name a few people in or out of the church who think they "know it all" but its all words, no action to follow Jesus by helping and loving others. Instead, they make others do the heavy lifting. Some people get stuck doing all the work others should do, that they have too many heavy burdens and get burn-out.

What matters is the huge and humbling principle of today's last two verses. "11 But the one who is greatest among you will be your servant. 12 All who lift themselves up will be brought low. But all who make themselves low will be lifted up."

When we look at those verses we realize, not for the first or last time, that we are indeed called to follow Jesus himself, who issued these condemnnations not from a great or pompous height, but on the way to the cross. Jesus had seen that on the journey he and his true followers had to make there would be no room for inflated shopping bags. Jesus had already promised that his load was easy and his burden was light, and that people carrying heavy loads should take his instead. Now he was on the way to shoulder the heaviest

burden of all, so that his people would never be weighed down by it. Amen.
