

*CALL TO CONFESSION:

Like the Israelites in the wilderness, we have been heard to complain. God is often blamed for calamities more than praised for the sustaining presence that works for our good. It is easier for us to be jealous of others than to rejoice in the opportunities God gives them. Surely we need to repent.

*UNISON PRAYER FOR TRANSFORMATION AND NEW LIFE: God of abundance, forgive us for embracing a worldview that capitalizes

on scarcity. Help us to know that you have given us enough for our journey. You have created us wonderfully and uniquely. Forgive us for comparing ourselves with our neighbor when we are called to love them. Help us to embrace how you have made us as individuals who may bring our singular gifts to our common life.

One God always here. SCRIPTURE LESSONS: Exodus 16:2-15

² The whole Israelite community complained against Moses and Aaron in the desert. ³ The Israelites said to them, "Oh, how we wish that the LORD had just put us to death while we were still in the land of Egypt. There we could sit by the pots cooking meat and eat our fill of bread. Instead, you've brought us out into this desert to starve this whole assembly to death."

⁴ Then the LORD said to Moses, "I'm going to make bread rain down from the sky for you. The people will go out each day and gather just enough for that day. In this way, I'll test them to see whether or not they follow my Instruction. ⁵ On the sixth day, when they measure out what they have collected, it will be twice as much as they collected on other days." ⁶So Moses and Aaron said to all the Israelites, "This evening you will know that it was the LORD who brought you out of the land of Egypt. ⁷And in the morning you will see the LORD's glorious presence, because your complaints against the LORD have been heard. Who are we? Why blame us?" ⁸ Moses continued, "The LORD will give you meat to eat in the evening and your fill of bread in the morning because the LORD heard the complaints you made against him. Who are we? Your complaints aren't against us but against the Lord."

⁹ Then Moses said to Aaron, "Say to the whole Israelite community, 'Come near to the LORD, because he's heard your complaints.'" ¹⁰ As Aaron spoke to the whole Israelite community, they turned to look toward the desert, and just then the glorious presence of the LORD appeared in the cloud. ¹¹ The LORD spoke to Moses, ¹² "I've heard the complaints of the Israelites. Tell them, 'At twilight you will eat meat. And in the morning you will have your fill of bread. Then you will know that I am the LORD your God.'"

¹³ In the evening a flock of quail flew down and covered the camp. And in the morning there was a layer of dew all around the camp. ¹⁴ When the layer of dew lifted, there on the desert surface were thin flakes, as thin as frost on the ground. ¹⁵ When the Israelites saw it, they said to each other, "What is it?" They didn't know what it was. Moses said to them, "This is the bread that the LORD has given you to eat.

EPISTLE LESSON: Philippians 1:21-30

²¹ Because for me, living serves Christ and dying is even better. ²² If I continue to live in this world, I get results from my work. ²³ But I don't know what I prefer. I'm torn between the two because I want to leave this life and be with Christ, which is far better. ²⁴ However, it's more important for me to stay in this world for your sake. ²⁵ I'm sure of this: I will stay alive and remain with all of you to help your progress and the joy of your faith, ²⁶ and to increase your pride in Christ Jesus through my presence when I visit you again.

²⁷ Most important, live together in a manner worthy of Christ's gospel. Do this, whether I come and see you or I'm absent and hear about you. Do this so that you stand firm, united in one spirit and mind as you struggle together to remain faithful to the gospel. ²⁸ That way, you won't be afraid of anything your enemies do. Your faithfulness and courage are a sign of their coming destruction and your salvation, which is from God.²⁹ God has generously granted you the privilege, not only of believing in Christ but also of suffering for Christ's sake. ³⁰ You are having the same struggle that you saw me face and now hear that I'm still facing.

*GOSPEL LESSON: Matthew 20:1-16 Workers in the vineyard

20 "The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire workers for his vineyard.² After he agreed with the workers to pay them a denarion, (a typical pay for a day's work) he sent them into his vineyard.

³ "Then he went out around nine in the morning and saw others standing around the marketplace doing nothing. ⁴ He said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard, and I'll pay you whatever is right.' ⁵ And they went.

"Again around noon and then at three in the afternoon, he did the same thing. ⁶ Around five in the afternoon he went and found others standing around, and he said to them, 'Why are you just

standing around here doing nothing all day long?'

""Because nobody has hired us,' they replied. He responded, 'You also go into the vineyard.'

⁸ "When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, 'Call the workers and give them their wages, beginning with the last ones hired and moving on finally to the first.' ⁹ When those who were hired at five in the afternoon came, each one received a denarion. ¹⁰ Now when those hired first came, they thought they would receive more. But each of them also received a denarion. ¹¹ When they received it, they grumbled against the

landowner, ¹² 'These who were hired last worked one hour, and they received the same pay as we did even though we had to work the whole day in the hot sun.' ¹³ "But he replied to one of them,

'Friend, I did you no wrong. Didn't I agree to pay you a denarion? ¹⁴ Take what belongs to you and go. I want to give to this one who was hired last the same as I give to you. ¹⁵ Don't I have the right to do what I want with what belongs to me? Or are you resentful because I'm generous?' ¹⁶ So those who are last will be first. And those who are first will be last."

MESSAGE: "What is fair in the Kingdom of Heaven?"

The first time I ever read this parable, many years ago, the hair on the back of my neck stood up. First, I was shocked and then I got angry. "WHAT? This isn't fair. Why do all the workers get paid the same, even those who only worked an hour?!!"

Now that I must preach on this passage, I have to calm down and take a wider view of this parable. After all, Jesus is trying to teach us something. Every parable Jesus gives us is a message to us about God, discipleship, the new covenant of love, and how to treat each other.

Last week we read a parable about forgiveness. We did not read the story from Matthew 19:16-22 of the rich young man who asked Jesus, "Teacher, what good thing must I do if I'm to possess the life of the age to come?" The young man wasn't simply asking about how to go to heaven after he died. As we've seen often enough, the phrase "kingdom of heaven" doesn't mean that. According to Rev. N.T. Wright, this phrase, kingdom of heaven, means "God's sovereign, saving rule coming to transform everything, coming to bring the whole creation into a new state of being, a new life, in which evil, decay and death itself will be done away."

Many, perhaps most Jews of Jesus' day, believed that Israel's God would brin in this new age, and would do it very soon. The question they were asking, in several different ways was; who would benefit from it when it happened? Who would inherit the 'age to come'? Who would gain the life of the new age, or, as in many translations,'eternal life'? Instead of giving this young man more complex legal instructions, Jesus has the simplest of commands; sell up, give it away and follow me.

As with so many lessons Jesus gives, some people have a problem with simple commands from Jesus. They want to know where to get a parachute, or buy a life saver. They can't imagine loving their neighbor as themselves, for example. After all, my neighbors have many children who are always dirty, and the couple isn't even married!

In Mathew 19:23-30 the theme is the first and the last. And then we come to today's parable. Who is first and who is last and what does that mean? And who decides what each will receive? Who decides what is fair?

To the workers who complained about the last receiving the same as the first, the landowner replied, "¹⁵ Don't I have the right to do what I want with what belongs to me? Or are you resentful because I'm generous?'"

We can scream and holler all we want, but if God choses to be generous to all people, even those WE think are not worthy, that is not ours to decide. How often do we make judgements about other people? "Don't give that beggar any money. He will just use it to buy drugs." Is it fair that God forgives ALL sinners? We want MORE mercy than all those in prisons. We get angry when God rewards those people who don't even go to church. And the list goes on.

"The first will be last, and the last first." No matter what we were taught all our lives to be first in line or by people who work hard to "get ahead" of everyone else in business or on our highways, that's not the way of the kingdom of God. Can we change our minds and hearts to be happy being last? God says, "Don't I have the right to do what I want with what belongs to me? Or are you resentful because I'm generous?" Amen.
