
FEBRUARY 28, 2024 SECOND SUNDAY IN LENT

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*CALL TO WORSHIP:

You have called us to discipleship, to self-emptying, and embracing your way with courage. May it be so. Amen.

*INVITATION TO CONFESSION: In this season, when we reexamine our lives and find our faith tested, we often discover a barrenness within. Our relationship with God is weak, not because God has turned away, but because we have failed to trust the Almighty or spend time in prayer. We have not sought God's answers to our daily problems. Let us be honest with our Creator in this time of prayer.

*PRAYER OF TRANSFORMATION AND NEW LIFE: Holy God, like Peter, sometimes we think we know better than you do. We make our own attempts to save ourselves and others from the cross filled path you have called us to walk. Help us to get behind you, because it has become easier to rely upon ourselves, rather than on your strength and presence. Grant us grace and help us to let go of our need for control so that you and your way might be our guide and path forward. Amen.

*WORDS OF GRACE:

Dear ones, may the God of compassion, Jesus the wounded healer, and the Holy Spirit who shapes and transforms us anew, grant you peace and hope for your soul. For we know that the One who calls us to follow in the way of Jesus is merciful and offers the consolation of love in a world of empty promises. Be at peace and thanks be to God.

*GLORIA: Glory to the Creator, and the Christ and the Spirit so near. As it was from the start so it shall be forever, One God always here. (repeat) (end) One God always here. One God always here.

SCRIPTURE LESSONS: Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16 God's covenant with Abraham

17 When Abram was 99 years old, the LORD appeared to Abram and said to him, "I am El Shaddai. Walk with me and be trustworthy. ² I will make a covenant between us and I will give you many, many descendants." ³ Abram fell on his face, and God said to him, ⁴ "But me, my covenant is with you; you will be

the ancestor of many nations. ⁵ And because I have made you the ancestor of many nations, your name will no longer be Abram but Abraham. ⁶ I will make you very fertile. I will produce nations from you, and kings will come from you. ⁷ I will set up my covenant with you and your descendants after you in every generation as an enduring covenant. I will be your God and your descendants' God after you. ¹⁵ God said to Abraham, "As for your wife Sarai, you will no longer call her Sarai. Her name will now be Sarah. ¹⁶ I will bless her and even give you a son from her. I will bless her so that she will become nations, and kings of peoples will come from her."

EPISTLE LESSON: Romans 4:13-25 The words of Paul Abraham's promise is received through faith

that he would inherit the world, didn't come through the Law but through the righteousness that comes from faith. ¹⁴ If they inherit because of the Law, then faith has no effect and the promise has been canceled. ¹⁵ The Law brings about wrath. But when there isn't any law, there isn't any violation of the law. ¹⁶ That's why the inheritance comes through faith, so that it will be on the basis of God's grace. In that way, the promise is secure for all of Abraham's descendants, not just for those who are related by Law but also for those who are related by the faith of Abraham, who is the father of all of us. ¹⁷ As it is

written: I have appointed you to be the father of many nations. So Abraham is our father in the eyes of God in whom he had faith, the God who gives life to the dead and calls things that don't exist into existence. ¹⁸ When it was beyond hope, he had faith in the hope that he would become the father of many nations, in keeping with the promise God spoke to him: That's how many descendants you will have. ¹⁹ Without losing faith, Abraham, who was nearly 100 years old, took into account his own body, which was as good as dead, and Sarah's womb, which was dead. ²⁰ He didn't hesitate with a lack of faith in God's promise, but he grew strong in faith and gave glory to God. ²¹ He was fully convinced that God was able to do what he promised. ²² Therefore, it was credited to him as righteousness. ²³ But the scripture that says it was credited to him wasn't written only for Abraham's sake. ²⁴ It was written also for our sake, because it is going to be credited to us too. It will be credited to those of us who have faith in the one who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead. ²⁵ He was handed over because of our mistakes, and he was raised to meet the requirements of righteousness for us.

*GOSPEL: Mark 8:31-38

³¹ Then Jesus began to teach his disciples: "The Human One must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders, chief priests, and the legal experts, and be killed, and then, after three days, rise from the

dead." ³² He said this plainly. But Peter took hold of Jesus and, scolding him, began to correct him. ³³ Jesus turned and looked at his disciples, then sternly corrected Peter: "Get behind me, Satan. You are not thinking God's thoughts but human thoughts."

³⁴ After calling the crowd together with his disciples, Jesus said to them, "All who want to come after me must say no to themselves, take up their cross, and follow me. ³⁵ All who want to save their lives will lose them. But all who lose their lives because of me and because of the good news will save them. ³⁶ Why would people gain the whole world but lose their lives? ³⁷ What will people give in exchange for their lives? ³⁸ Whoever is ashamed of me and my words in this unfaithful and sinful generation, the Human One will be ashamed of that person when he comes in the Father's glory with the holy angels."

These are the ancient words revealed to us anew.

MESSAGE: "Difficult teachings"

There are many things going on in our scripture texts this morning. The Genesis, Romans text and the Psalm talk about God's covenant promises to the Israelites. What is a covenant? It's an agreement, contract, treaty, pledge, or a promise. In Genesis we can read about God's promise concerning land and descendants that God makes with Abraham. God

calls Abram to leave his country and go out to unknown lands to become the Father of many nations. His name will be great and he will be a blessing to all the families of the earth. How would you feel if God said that to you? I think it would provide some blind trust on our part.

I the letters to the Romans, the Apostle Paul talks to his church about this covenant. For Paul, o First Testament character exemplified genuine faith better than did Abraham. This text from Paul reminds us that justification by faith and salvation by grace go hand in hand. To have implicit trust in a faithful God is to recognize that we are saved by a generous and uncalculated gift of divine grace from God. Seen this way, salvation is always a gift, never a reward. That's another promise from God.

Now that we are comfortable with those promises from God, along comes Jesus to make us uncomfortable. The disciples have just told Jesus that they know he is the Messiah. Now Jesus tells them he will suffer many things, be rejected by the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed. However, he will rise again after three days. They miss that part of this prediction from Jesus.

If you had been following this prophet around Judah with this man for perhaps years by now, and you have believed everything he has taught them. And now he makes this prediction of his suffering death, what would you think? What would you feel?

Perhaps you would feel ashamed that you had been tricked by this con artist. You trusted Jesus and now you don't know what to believe. What kind of promise is Jesus giving them? No wonder Peter was upset. The Messiah is not supposed to suffer or be killed. The Messiah is supposed to rule the world with justice and love.

And then Jesus continues to challenge them and all the people in the crowd around them. "If anyone wishes to come after me, let him deny himself, and let him take up his cross, and let him follow me." What a shock those words from Jesus were? Just the word "cross" is bad enough. At least Jesus is telling them the truth about their association with Jesus; what they can expect? I'm sure some in the crowd decided to walk away. They had other plans for their lives.

The cherry on top of the cake is found in the last two things we read in this text. Jesus says, "whoever seeks to save his life shall lose it: and whoever loses his life for my sake and for the sake of the gospel shall save it." Does this mean we are trapped? If we leave, we die?

BUT WAIT, THERE'S MORE!! Verses 36 – 38. "Why would people gain the whole world but lose their lives?" (*That sounds like a trick question.*) Jesus continues, "What will people give in exchange for their lives? Whoever is ashamed of me and my words in this unfaithful and sinful generation, the Human

One will be ashamed of that person when he comes in the Father's glory with the holy angels."

I have no answers for you. Read over what Jesus says in this text and decide for yourself. Words to think about. Challenges to meditate on. Decisions to pray about.
