SCRIPTURE LESSONS: Jonah 3:1-5, 10 Nineveh hears God's word

3 The LORD's word came to Jonah a second time: ² "Get up and go to Nineveh, that great city, and declare against it the proclamation that I am commanding you." ³ And Jonah got up and went to Nineveh, according to the LORD's word. (Now Nineveh was indeed an enormous city, a three days' walk across.)

⁴ Jonah started into the city, walking one day, and he cried out, "Just forty days more and Nineveh will be overthrown!" ⁵ And the people of Nineveh believed

God. They proclaimed a fast and put on mourning clothes, from the greatest of them to the least significant. God saw what they were doing—that they had ceased their evil behavior. So God stopped planning to destroy them, and he didn't do it.

¹⁴ After John was arrested, Jesus came into Galilee announcing God's good news, ¹⁵ saying, "Now is the time! Here comes God's kingdom! Change your hearts and lives, and trust this good news!"

¹⁶ As Jesus passed alongside the Galilee Sea, he saw two brothers, Simon and Andrew, throwing fishing

nets into the sea, for they were fishermen. ¹⁷ "Come, follow me," he said, "and I'll show you how to fish for people." ¹⁸ Right away, they left their nets and followed him. ¹⁹ After going a little farther, he saw James and John, Zebedee's sons, in their boat repairing the fishing nets. ²⁰ At that very moment he called them. They followed him, leaving their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired workers.

These are the Ancient Words revealed to us anew.

MESSAGE: "Security"

What is the definition of the word "security"? Webster says "security is protection from, or resilience against, potential harm (or other unwanted coercion) caused by others by restraining the freedom of others to act.

I would add that the word safety is right up there next to security.

Security is a home with heat, a roof, and food in the fridge. Security is knowing that you have or had a good job that can pay for that home, heat, and food.

When we get to a certain age it's time to seek for that job. Perhaps some of us joined our family's

business where there is security and the safety that comes with a thriving business.

We have no idea how many generations the Zebedee family had been fishing on the sea of Galilee, but it was quite likely a lot mor than four. I that country and culture, as in many countries and cultures to this day, a small family business can be handed on not only through generations but through centuries. It's safe and secure; people know what they're doing. If times are hard, the usual answer is simply to work a bit harder.

But then along came the young prophet from Nazareth, and he told James and john, and their neighbors Peter and Andrew, to drop it all and follow him. And they did. They didn't stop to ask about benefits such as health insurance, pension plans, how many vacation days they would get and what shift they would work. They didn't ask "where are we going?" or "how long will we be gone?" What about their families? Did they have a chance to stop by their homes and tell their wives where they were going? Imagine what these ladies thought when their husbands didn't come home for dinner and how are their families going to survive without a breadwinner.

Only when you think about the sort of life Peter, Andrew, James, and Jon had had, and the totally unknown future Jesus was inviting them into, do we understand just how earth-shattering this little story that we just heard from the Bible was and is. Leave everything you've known, all your security, your family, (and family solidarity was hugely important in that culture), and follow Jesus. Some people face that call today.

The way the author of the Gospel of Mark tells the story sends echoes ringing back through the scriptures the larger narrative of God's people. "Leave your country and your father's house", said God to Abraham, "and go to the land I will show you." Abraham, like Peter and the others, did what he was told, and went where he was sent. Mark is hinting to his readers that the old family business of the people of God is being left behind. God wants a new story to be written and is calling a new people to write it.

And the name of the story is "the kingdom of God." This was what all Israel had been waiting for. It wasn't a new piece of good advice. It wasn't a new political agenda. It wasn't a new type of spirituality. It might eventually lead to advice, agendas and certainly to prayer, but it was itself something more than all of these. It was the good (and extremely dangerous) news that the living God was on the move, was indeed now coming into God's kingdom.

And it demanded a definite response. It was "God's good news."

If we were to walk down the street of any town or village with any Christian background and were to call out "Repent and believe the gospel," people would think they knew what we meant: "Give up your sins and become a Christian." Of course, Jesus wanted people to stop sinning, but "repentance" for him meant two rather different things as well. First, it meant turning away from the social and political agendas which were driving Israel into a crazy, ruinous war. We can imagine someone saying that today in a country of ideologies are driving half the population into violent behavior.

Secondly, repentance meant calling Israel to turn back to a true loyalty to YHWH, their God. This was what had to happen before God would redeem Israel at last. The call to repent is part of the announcement that this was the time for the great moment of freedom, of God's rescue.

That's why it goes with the call to believe. Jesus' contemporaries trusted all sorts of things: their ancestry, their land, their temple, their laws. Even their God – provided that this God did what they expected God to do. Jesus was now calling them to trust the good news that their God was doing something new. To get in on the act, they had to cut

loose from other ties and trust Jesus and his message. That wasn't easy then and isn't easy now. But it's what Peter, Andrew, James, and John did, and it's what all Christians are called to do today, tomorrow, and on into God's future.

Are we today willing to give up on present securities to follow Jesus and trust God's future?

Sovereign God, Living Lord Jesus, Eternal Spirit, we cannot tell what life will bring us, but we do believe that you will ever leave us, whatever comes. If sorrow comes, comfort us with the hope of glory. If illness comes, help us to bear it gallantly and to reach health again. If disappointment comes, help us always to remember that in spite of everything, the best is always yet to be. If we have to face a hard task or a difficult decision, make us sure that with the challenge there comes the power to do. If we are tempted, help us to turn to the One who was also tempted and who conquered and who can enable us to share his victory. If we are to be misunderstood and unappreciated, help us always to remember that you know us and that it is your verdict that matters.

Especially bless those who are in trouble and distress not of their own making; those to whom what has happened is beyond ay explanation that

they may accept what they cannot understand; those who have been led astray by someone else, that even yet they may find a way back; those whose background and environment never really gave them a chance. Help them to rise above their circumstances and grant that we who are more fortunate may not rest until we rid this land of conditions in which no one should have to live, in circumstances in which no human being should be entangled.

Bless our world. Bless all those in authority. Bless all whom we love and especially those from whom we are separated.

Bless each and all of us that we may follow faithfully in the steps of our Lord Jesus Christ until with him we stand before your throne, O God. Amen.
