

SCRIPTURE LESSON:

*GOSPEL LESSON: Mark 16:1-8 the Empty tomb

16 When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices so that they could go and anoint Jesus' dead body. ² Very early on the first day of the week, just after sunrise, they came to the tomb. ³ They were saying to each other, "Who's going to roll the stone away from the entrance for us?" 4 When they looked up, they saw that the stone had been rolled away. (And it was a very large stone!) ⁵ Going into the tomb, they saw a young man in a white robe seated on the right side; and they were startled. ⁶ But he said to them, "Don't be alarmed! You are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. [a] He has been raised. He isn't here. Look, here's the place where they laid him. ⁷Go, tell his disciples, especially Peter, that he is going ahead of you into Galilee. You will see him there, just as he told you." 8 Overcome with terror and dread, they fled from the tomb. They said nothing to anyone, because they were afraid.

These are the ancient words revealed to us anew.

MESSAGE: "The Rest of the Story" (with thoughts from William Barclay)

Did you notice the last line I read? "They said nothing to anyone, because they were afraid." It's actually the last sentence we have from the author of the Gospel of Mark. The women told NO ONE! So, what are we

doing here? If they told no one, how did we ever know who Jesus was?

For years Bible Scholars have tried to answer that question at the end of this gospel. Actually, some were so unsettled about this ending that they wrote one or several. It's obvious that what they wrote was not what the author of the Gospel of Mark wrote. The style and sentence structure are not the same.

In todays' Bible this extra ending is marked in brackets or mentioned in foot notes. Another explanation is that the original writings of Mark were written in a scroll and carried to different villages and communities to be read out loud. The listeners already knew about the resurrection so they spoke it at the end even if it wasn't written in the scroll. Most scholars believe that originally there was a better ending written by Mark, but it was at the end of a scroll and got tattered and worn and was lost.

However, let's go back and talk about what IS written in this Gospel. There had not been time to render the last services to the body of Jesus. The Sabbath had intervened and the women who wished to anoint the body had not been able to do so since Jews were prohibited from doing any kind of work on the Sabbath. As early as possible after the Sabbath had passed, they set out to perform this sad task.

They were worried about one thing. Tombs had no doors. When the word door is mentioned it really means *opening*. In front of the opening was a groove,

and in the groove ran a very large circular stone. The women knew that it was quite beyond their strength to move a stone like that. But when they reached the tomb, the stone was rolled away, and inside was a messenger who gave them the unbelievable news that Jesus had risen from the dead.

One thing is certain — if Jesus had not risen from the dead, we would never have heard about him. The attitude of the women was that they had come to pay the last tribute to a dead body. The attitude of the disciples was that everything had finished in tragedy. By far the best proof of the resurrection is the existence of our Christian church right here. Nothing else could have changed sad and despairing men and women into people radiant with joy. The resurrection is the central fact of the whole Christian faith. And because we believe in the resurrection certain things follow.

- 1.) Jesus is not a figure in a book but a living presence. It is not enough to study the story of Jesus like the life of any other great historical figure. We may begin that way but we must end by meeting him.
- 2.) Jesus is not a memory but a presence. (repeat) The dearest memory fades. Long since, time would have wiped out the memory of Jesus unless he had been a living presence forever with us. Our most wonderful memories eventually fade and some parts are lost and

- eventually all may be gone from our minds. Jesus is not someone to discuss so much as someone to meet.
- 3.) The Christian life is not a matter of knowing about Jesus, but of knowing Jesus. You know what I mean? There is all the difference in the world between knowing about a person and knowing a person. You may know the name of your neighbor but you don't really know anything else about them. Most people know about the President of the United States but not so many know him. The greatest scholar in the world who knows everything about Jesus is less than the humblest Christian who knows him.
- 4.) There is an endless quality about the Christian faith. It should never stand still. Because our Lord is a living Lord there are new wonders and new truths waiting to be discovered all the time.

We can continue knowing Jesus over and over as we watch what he has done and continues to do; from birthing a new healthy baby to a flower blooming on the wayside. If we try, we can feel his arm around us when we are distressed. If we listen very carefully, we can hear him speak to us. We can feel him in our hearts when we take communion. We can picture him when we sing wonderful, inspirational hymns.

We can see him in the smile of a friend or a child when you fulfill a need they may have.

We don't need to remember the risen Christ on this Easter. We know him because his presence is with us always. Amen.
