Fourth Sunday of Advent

Week Four The readings this week tell the beginning of the almost-too-familiar story of Incarnation. 2 Samuel 7 reveals God longing to be among the people. At long last "at rest from their enemies", King David worries that the Presence of God with Israel dwells in temporary shelter. David wants to honor God with a more permanent tabernacle. But God's Prophet Nathan challenges him: "Are you the one to build God a house?" Since the time of Exodus, God has been content to "move about" with the people in their midst, in tent and shelter, intimately engaged with them as they make their precarious way in the world. God's desire is to "plant" the weary people in a place of safety with wise leadership, and access to God's own Presence.

Although in another generation Israel will build a Temple with a space set apart for the Holy One, in this moment God desires to live life "on the ground" with the people. David's descendants, however, will have a different kind of house: a dynasty formed from the family of the humble shepherd, called into leadership by God.

The Gospel of Luke tells the story of God again seeking dwelling place amidst the people, in Mary's womb. Mary, who is part of a poor branch of David's house, will offer the Holy One shelter and nourishment to grow into the fulness of human life.

One of Mary's ancient titles in the Church is Theotokos, "God-Bearer". Her dialogue with the Angel sets the stage for the Holy One to continue the direct and intimate involvement of the Divine with humanity—incarnation as one of us—Divine love and presence becoming flesh of our flesh, bone of our bone. Her song of joy in the Magnificat declares the promise of such Love, to change the world from within to become a place of justice and peace.

Why would God choose to be at work in the world from the inside out? How does it feel to know God longs to be with us?

SCRIPTURE: 2 Samuel 7:1-11, 16

God's promise to David

7 When the king was settled in his palace, and the LORD had given him rest from all his surrounding enemies, ² the king said to the prophet Nathan, "Look! I'm living in a cedar palace, but God's chest is housed in a tent!"

³ Nathan said to the king, "Go ahead and do whatever you are thinking, because the LORD is with you." ⁴ But that very night the LORD's word came to

Nathan: ⁵ Go to my servant David and tell him: This is what the LORD says: You are not the one to build the temple for me to live in. 6 In fact, I haven't lived in a temple from the day I brought Israel out of Egypt until now. Instead, I have been traveling around in a tent and in a dwelling. ⁷Throughout my traveling around with the Israelites, did I ever ask any of Israel's tribal leaders I appointed to shepherd my people: Why haven't you built me a cedar temple? ⁸ So then, say this to my servant David: This is what the LORD of heavenly forces says: I took you from the pasture, from following the flock, to be leader over my people Israel. 9 I've been with you wherever you've gone, and I've eliminated all your enemies before you. Now I will make your name great—like the name of the greatest people on earth. 10 l'm going to provide a place for my people Israel, and plant them so that they may live there and no longer be disturbed. Cruel people will no longer trouble them, as they had been earlier, ¹¹ when I appointed leaders over my people Israel. And I will give you rest from all your enemies. And the LORD declares to you that the LORD will make a dynasty for you. ¹⁶ Your dynasty and your kingdom will be secured forever before me. Your throne will be established forever.



MESSAGE: "Where does God live?"

This week we move from one prophetic message

(Isaiah) to another (Samuel.) You might remember that Samuel was the prophet who anointed the shepherd boy, the son of Jesse, who became King David. In case you are curious, King David ruled somewhere between 1035 – 970 B.C. and the Babylonia exile was from 597 – 538 B.C., so we are going backwards in time. (B.C. counts backwards from when Jesus was born and A.D. started.) Crazy, right?

Anyway, what does this story have to do with Advent and Christmas? First of all, it describes God's promise to David that his dynasty would continue (verses 9-11, 16).

My thought about this text has to do with the question of where is God? Ancient people thought that God could only be found in certain places such as in the Ark, inside a tent, or in a temple. God was trying to teach King David, through the prophet Nathan, that God was with David all his life. (verses 8-9). In other words, God doesn't stay in one place.

God longed to be with us and now God is with us in the gift of his son, Jesus, as an impression of God. Jesus is born just as any other person, and lived among us. God, through Jesus, experienced everything that humans do. God lives everywhere and we can "see" God wherever we see love. Who taught us that? This baby whom we will celebrate his birth in just a few days. God incarnate. God made visible in this very special child. Amen.

PASTORAL PRAYER:

Most Holy One, we are so grateful that you have blessed us in so many ways. First, by sending this child who will grow up to be our savior



and redeemer. That's the best gift anyone could ask for. Secondly, we are grateful that vaccines have been prepared for all of us, to put an end to this pandemic. Thank you for sending people who are helping those who have been out of work because of the pandemic; all those who are finding ways to feed those who are hungry, all those who are finding ways to teach our children, all those who are calling shut-ins and those who are lonely.

We pray for them all but give you, Gracious God, the glory for making this relief possible. We continue by praying the prayer your son taught us. . .

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come; Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory forever. Amen.
