In sacred times of word, wonder, and awe, in ordinary days of work and play:

## CALL TO RECONCILIATION:

As we stand before God, we think of all the ways we bicker with others, all those times we have not shown mercy and grace to those around us. Let us bow our hearts and confess our sin to God, as we pray together, saying,

## UNISON PRAYER FOR FORGIVENESS:

It is never easy for us to confess but deep down inside, we know that graced, we have trouble

being grace-full to others; forgiven, we are eager to judge and punish all who hurt us; freed, we find ways to put restrictions on people we fear. Forgive us, Servant God. You show mercy more often than we deserve; you pardon us more times than we can count. And why? Because we are the Lord's - sisters and brothers of Jesus Christ, who died and lived again, so we might live beyond death with you. Silence is kept

## SCRIPTURE: Matthew 18:21-35

<sup>21</sup> Then Peter said to Jesus, "Lord, how many times should I forgive my brother or sister who sins against me? Should I forgive as many as seven times?"

<sup>22</sup> Jesus said, "Not just seven times, but rather as many as seventy-seven times.<sup>[a]</sup> <sup>23</sup> Therefore, the kingdom of heaven is like a king who wanted to settle accounts with his servants. <sup>24</sup> When he began to settle accounts, they brought to him a servant who owed him ten thousand bags of gold.<sup>[b]</sup> <sup>25</sup> Because the servant didn't have enough to pay it back, the master ordered that he should be

sold, along with his wife and children and everything he had, and that the proceeds should be used as payment. <sup>26</sup> But the servant fell down, kneeled before him, and said, 'Please, be patient with me, and I'll pay you back.' <sup>27</sup> The master had compassion on that servant, released him, and forgave the loan.

<sup>28</sup> "When that servant went out, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him one hundred coins. <sup>[c]</sup> He grabbed him around the throat and said, 'Pay me back what you owe me.'

<sup>29</sup> "Then his fellow servant fell down and begged him, 'Be patient with me, and I'll pay you back.' <sup>30</sup> But he refused. Instead, he threw him into prison until he paid back his debt.

they were deeply offended. They came and told their master all that happened. His master called the first servant and said, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you all that debt because you appealed to me. Shouldn't you also have mercy on your fellow servant, just as I had mercy on you? His master was furious and handed him over to the guard responsible for punishing prisoners, until he had paid the whole debt.

## SERMON: "Judging Worth"

As humans, we judge the worth of things. Is that head of lettuce really worth what is being charged? Is that new car I want to buy worth the price on the sticker? Is that charity worth my donation? Is that book worthy of my time to read?

Judging the worth of those types of things are helpful. The problem comes when we judge the worth of people, especially people who have hurt us; perhaps by cheating us, or by insulting us. Are those people worthy of my forgiveness?

Forgiveness is a subject many people do not like to discuss, perhaps because forgiveness can be very hard to do. As humans, I believe we have a tendency to judge who is worthy of forgiveness, and that can be a stumbling block for following what Jesus is telling us to do. Jesus taught the disciples to forgive seventy-seven times, in other words, forgive more times than can be counted.

Sometimes forgiving someone is easier than at other times. If someone takes the parking spot you had your eye on, you can forgive them and find

another spot. But what about forgiving those who kill children in their school, or shoot people as they worship? How do we forgive those people?

From the cross Jesus said "Father forgive them (all of us) for they know not what they are doing." Perhaps these words are a clue for us to help when we think we can not forgive; ask our heavenly Father to forgive those people who we consider as being unworthy of forgiveness. After all, God is the final judge for all of us. Will God judge **US** worthy of forgiveness?

Amen.

## **PASTORAL PRAYER:**

When we look over our shoulders at fear shadowing us today, you, dear God, go before us into tomorrow, making a path through the sea of yesterday's doubts. When our legs tremble from the effort of standing up for what you hope for all creation, you are at our side, offering your heart's strength to us.

We pray for those suffering from Covid, those who are ill, those who are unemployed, those who care for those in critical condition. And we pray for our church. May we heed the words of our Savior as we care for others.

As we partake of the cup, we share Christ's Spirit with our neighbors, and are called to welcome all as our sisters and brothers, especially those held captive by the bitterness of the world.

As you gathered your children to lead them to that promised land, so you will bring all your children from the very ends of time itself, to seat us around your heart, where we will feast on your grace, lifting our hearts to praise you forever:

God our Maker, Christ our Brother, Spirit our Compassion, one God, now and forever. Amen.

(Place your hands, palm side down, above the elements.) Holy Spirit, we ask you to bless this bread and this cup. Through this meal, make us the body of Christ, that we may join with you in promoting the well-being of all creation. Amen.

(Partake of the elements)
