EPISTLE READING: 2 Thessalonians 3:6-13

The apostle Paul gives the Thessalonians a strong recommendation that they be steadfast in their daily

work as they anticipate the unknown day of the return of Jesus.

Discipline for the undisciplined

⁶ Brothers and sisters, we command you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ to stay away from every brother or sister who lives an undisciplined life that is not in line with the traditions that you received from us. ⁷ You yourselves know how you need to imitate us because we were not undisciplined when we were with you. ⁸ We didn't eat anyone's food without

paying for it. Instead, We worked night and day with effort and hard work so that we would not impose on you. ⁹ We did this to give you an example to imitate, not because we didn't have a right to insist on financial support. ¹⁰ Even when we were with you we were giving you this command: "If anyone doesn't want to work, they shouldn't eat." ¹¹ We hear that some of you are living an undisciplined life. They aren't working, but they are meddling in other people's business. ¹² By the Lord Jesus Christ, we command and encourage such people to work quietly and put their own food on the table. ¹³ Brothers and sisters, don't get discouraged in doing what is right.

*GOSPEL LESSON: Luke 21:5-19

Jesus encourages endurance under persecution that will surely come.

The temple's fate

⁵ Some people were talking about the temple, how it was decorated with beautiful stones and ornaments dedicated to God. Jesus said, ⁶ "As for the things you are admiring, the time is coming when not even one stone will be left upon another. All will be demolished." ⁷ They asked him, "Teacher, when will these things happen? What sign will show that these things are about to happen?"

⁸ Jesus said, "Watch out that you aren't deceived. Many will come in my name, saying, 'I'm the one!' and 'It's time!' Don't follow them. ⁹ When you hear of wars and rebellions, don't be alarmed. These things must happen first, but the end won't happen immediately." ¹⁰ Then Jesus said to them, "Nations and kingdoms will fight against each other. ¹¹ There will be great earthquakes and wide-scale food shortages and epidemics. There will also be terrifying sights and great signs in the sky. ¹² But before all this occurs, they will take you into custody and harass you because of your faith. They will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. ¹³ This will provide you with an opportunity to

testify. ¹⁴ Make up your minds not to prepare your defense in advance. ¹⁵ I'll give you words and wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to counter or contradict. ¹⁶ You will be betrayed by your parents, brothers and sisters, relatives, and friends. They will execute some of you. ¹⁷ Everyone will hate you because of my name. ¹⁸ Still, not a hair on your heads will be lost. ¹⁹ By holding fast, you will gain your lives.

This is the Word of God. It is true and can be trusted.

MESSAGE: "Bad News and Good News"

In my preaching class at seminary the professor taught us to "always preach the good news of the Gospel." The good news of the Gospel. When I read the Gospel lesson today, DID YOU HEAR ANY GOOD NEWS?! Maybe, in the last two verses, after frightening us with bad news.

In general, I'm an optimistic person. I like sunshine and roses. I want life to be almost perfect. And then I read this passage. That certainly knocked the smile off my face.

First Jesus informs his disciples that the temple will be destroyed. Unfortunately for Jesus, this comment is overheard by the temple authorities and

later Jesus is accused of being a terrorist who plans to blow up the temple.

Next the disciples ask Jesus when these things will happen? I think that's a reasonable question. We all would like to know when we should take our money out of the bank and head for the bomb shelters we built in the 60's.

Instead, Jesus gives us "signs". He first mentions false "gods" who will tells us lies. We will be tempted to "worship false idols." This may seem unlikely, however look at what we worship now; pretty cars, nice houses, gourmet food, speed boats, television, facebook, designer clothes, movie stars, rock stars. You name it, we want it, and we become obessed. Jesus tells us, "Many will come in my name, saying, 'I'm the one!' and 'It's time!' Don't follow them."

Then Jesus tells us not to be afraid of wars, natural disasters, drought, food shortages, famine, epidemics, betrayal, executions, which will come before everything is said and done. YIKES! But here comes the good news. Jesus says, "¹⁸ Still, not a hair on your heads will be lost. ¹⁹ By holding fast, you will gain your lives." If we can make it through all that bad news, I guess we will be ready for this good news. I can smile again.

When Jesus talks about "gaining our lives", he is talking about a new reality for us. Something new. Something different. A better way to live our lives.

It makes me think about college students who move away from home and live in a dormitory away from people they know. Or those who have to move away from home for a new job. Or, on the other side of our life, when our elderly loved ones need to move to some kind of facility where they are safe and taken care of. That can be terrifying for older folks. It may take a very long time before they "hear the good news of the Gospel" when everything around them is new and different.

One thing that makes me hopeful are the words of Isaiah in our First Testament reading.

"17 Look! I'm creating a new heaven and a new earth: past events won't be remembered; they won't come to mind. 18 Be glad and rejoice forever in what I'm creating, because I'm creating Jerusalem as a joy and her people as a source of gladness."

Read the rest of the passage again. Hang on to those words. Know that God will never abandon you no matter the changes in our lives. THE WORDS OF JESUS ARE POWERFUL and can move the clouds away if you allow them into your heart.

Anchor yourself to Jesus and hang on to the good news of the Gospel. It can be hard, but if we read the

good news over and over, we can smile again. Amen.

Sustain all who give themselves to serve those in need; those who teach immigrants, social workers who care for the poor and the incompetent, church visitors who attend to shut-ins and those who send them cards. Bless all our clinics, nursing homes, hospitals, and health services that your work of healing may continue among us.

Merciful Parent, heal your children who look to you for new health and strength; children with RSV, those of all ages with covid or cancer, and tiny babies especially Alistair and Garrett. May they grow strong so they may go to their loving home and be celebrated by their waiting brother, Trenton.

We pray all these things in the name of the one who taught us to pray . . .
