SCRIPTURE LESSONS: Acts 1:1-11 The risen Jesus with his disciples

1 Theophilus, the first scroll I wrote concerned everything Jesus did and taught from the beginning, ² right up to the day when he was taken up into heaven. Before he was taken up, working in the power of the Holy Spirit, Jesus instructed the apostles he had chosen. ³ After his suffering, he showed them that he was alive with many convincing proofs. He appeared to them over a period of forty days, speaking to them about God's kingdom. 4 While they were eating together, he ordered them not to leave Jerusalem but to wait for what the Father had promised. He said, "This is what you heard from me: 5 John baptized with water, but in only a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit." ⁶ As a result, those who had gathered together asked Jesus, "Lord, are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel now?"

⁷ Jesus replied, "It isn't for you to know the times or seasons that the Father has set by his own authority. ⁸ Rather, you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth."

⁹ After Jesus said these things, as they were watching, he was lifted up and a cloud took him out of their sight. ¹⁰ While he was going away and as they were staring toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood next to them. ¹¹ They said, "Galileans, why are you standing here, looking toward heaven? This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way that you saw him go into heaven."

READING FROM THE EPISTLE OF Ephesians 1:15-23 Paul's prayer for the Ephesians

¹⁵ Since I heard about your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love for all God's people, this is the reason that ¹⁶ I don't stop giving thanks to God for you when I remember you in my prayers. ¹⁷ I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, will give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation that makes God known to you. ¹⁸ I pray that the eyes of your heart will have enough light to see what is the hope of God's call, what

is the richness of God's glorious inheritance among believers, ¹⁹ and what is the overwhelming greatness of God's power that is working among us believers. This power is conferred by the energy of God's powerful strength. ²⁰ God's power was at work in Christ when God raised him from the dead and sat him at God's right side in the heavens, ²¹ far above every ruler and authority and power and angelic power, any power that might be named not only now but in the future. ²² God put everything under Christ's feet and made him head of everything in the church, ²³ which is his body. His body, the church, is the fullness of Christ, who fills everything in every way.

*GOSPEL LESSON: Luke 24:44-53

⁴⁴ Jesus said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the Law from Moses, the Prophets, and the Psalms must be fulfilled." ⁴⁵ Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures. ⁴⁶ He said to them, "This is what is written: the Christ will suffer and rise from the dead on the third day, ⁴⁷ and a change of heart and life for the forgiveness of sins must be preached in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. ⁴⁸ You are witnesses of these things. ⁴⁹ Look, I'm sending to you what my Father promised, but you are to stay in the city until you have been furnished with heavenly power."

Ascension of Jesus

⁵⁰ He led them out as far as Bethany, where he lifted his hands and blessed them. ⁵¹ As he blessed them, he left them and was taken up to heaven. ⁵² They worshipped him and returned to Jerusalem overwhelmed with joy. ⁵³ And they were continuously in the temple praising God.

MESSAGE: "No Balloons or Brass Bands"

The custom of celebrating the Ascension of Christ forty days after Easter, or on the Sixth Thursday during the fifth-day period from Easter to Pentecost, is largely attributable to the mention of "forty days" in today's first lesson. Since we don't have worship on the sixth Thursday, perhaps that's why I don't remember talking about it that much.

At the outset, we should note that quite often the New Testament does NOT clearly distinguish Jesus' ascension from his resurrection. Rather, we are often told simply that after his death, he was "exalted," or "taken up", as if his resurrection is itself his ascension. This is noted in 7 different places in the New Testament; Romans twice, Philippians 2:9, Ephesians 4:8-10, 1 Peter 3:22; Hebrews 4:14 and 7:26.

By contrast, the author of the gospel of Luke sees the resurrection of Jesus and his ascension into heaven as two separate events, separated in time by forty days.

(As you know, the author of the gospel of Luke is the same author of the book of Acts. So today we heard two versions of the ascension from the same writer.)

There are several features of today's Acts 1:1-11 text that are worth noting in the context of our celebration of Ascension. First, it is a time of recollection. We are told in verse 3 that during the forty days, the risen Lord presented himself to the disciples as alive and spoke to them concerning the kingdom of God. Not only had this been one of the major themes of the preaching of John the Baptist but of Jesus as well. This involved the announcement that the sovereign reign of God had now set in – a time of hope for the poor, the captive, the sick, and the oppressed as written in Luke 4:18-19.

But in spite of the abundant teaching of Jesus concerning the kingdom of God, especially through the form of parables, confusion still abounded. Those who heard his preaching found it next to impossible to disentangle God's promise of a new era of divine sovereignty from their own options of nationalism. How can we believe a kingdom that we can't see and we don't know when it's coming? We are told not to ask; just to wait?

Secondly, this celebration of the ascension is a time of anticipation. The disciples are instructed to "wait there for the promise of the Father" (verse 4). The time when the Holy Spirit would be poured out in abundance is not

far off, and when it occurs it would be a great outburst of power. In fact, the Spirit and power are closely linked as stated in 8 places in the New Testament. The Book of Acts provides thorough documentation of the powerful energy unleashed by the Spirit beginning with the Day of Pentecost (which we will celebrate next Sunday). Be sure to glue your toupee and wigs on tight.

The conversation next points to the ultimate return of Christ. The disciples are assured that his coming will be in the manner similar to that of his departure. (verse 11) In both cases, the cast of the eye is forward.

The disciples are now with the risen Lord, but their attention is directed toward a time when he will no longer be with them in the same way. He will be absent but present with them through the Spirit. The power they now feel in his presence they will experience even when he is absent. They are thus instructed to stop gazing into heaven and be about the business at hand — waiting for the renewal that will begin in Jerusalem.

It is precisely this tension between recollection and anticipation that is felt in the celebration of Ascension. On the one hand, we want to hold on to Easter and the risen Lord, Yet we are being beckoned to let go and look to the coming Spirit as the One who will lead us into the future.

PASTORAL PRAYER:

God of the present and the future we are not very good at waiting. We want things right now. We want to see Jesus right now. We forget he is always with us; right now and forever. Help us to continue to pray, day after day, hour after hour, minute by minute as we reach for the hand of our neighbor and pray the prayer of Jesus . . .
