Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

I have a problem with language and I'm not talking about a "foreign language". I'm talking about English. For example, in Matthew 18:18 in the New Revised Standard Version (written before our CEB translation) we can read, "Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven." WHY DON'T THEY JUST SAY LOOSENED? I understand that better than loosed.

Sometimes the meaning of some words change over time. We used to say "we had a gay old time." (That's actually a lyric from the theme song for the Flintstones.) Now we use the word "gay" in a different way.

When I was a child my "old-maid" school teacher Aunt used to babysit for me. She had a room in the house next door to us, one room with all she needed; a radio but no TV, a sewing machine, an iron board, a bed, and bookshelves filled to the brim. She shard a bathroom with the children of the owners and she ate all her meals with us next door.

To keep me busy while she sewed her clothes and many of mine, she would have me sit on her bed and, using the **King James Version**, she had me memorize the **23<sup>rd</sup> Psalm**. Yes, it was in English however with all those thee's and thou's it sounded foreign to me. I just didn't understand it. I think that can happen even in our most modern Bible translations. We can pronounce the words but we may not know what it means. It sounds "foreign" to us.

### **PENNIES FOR MISSION:**



April pennies went to the Uni Pres Kindercottage.

MAY pennies will go to "Strengthen the Church" one of the UCC Five-for-Five missions. (For more information, see below.) Thank you to everyone who puts money in the square tin each week to help support these mission projects.



Due to your generosity, once again St. John has received a certificate for sending offerings to Our Church's Wider Mission (OCWM) and the four special offerings of the UCC. I thought I would share a little bit about those offerings.

**Our Church's Wider Mission** When we give to Our Church's Wider Mission, 25% of your gift goes on to support the work of the national setting and 75% of your gift is retained here in the Illinois South Conference to support the ministry and resources we extend to our church and all the UCC member churches of our Conference.

**One Great Hour of Sharing** channels resources for international programs in health, education and agriculture development, emergency relief, refugee ministries, and both international and domestic response.

**Strengthen the Church** re-imagines and builds the future of the UCC. **Shared between our conference (Illinois South) and National** levels of the denomination,

Strengthen the Church largely supports youth ministries and full-time leaders for new churches in parts of the country where the UCC does not have a strong presence. It also provides support for the existing church's new initiatives.

**Neighbors in Need** supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States, including the Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM), justice and advocacy, and direct service projects supported by Justice and Local Church Ministries.

The Christmas Fund (formally known as the Veterans of the Cross and the Emergency Fund) is a special mission offering that congregations have been supporting for over 100 years. The offering is administered through the United Church Board for Ministerial Assistance, the charitable arm of the Pension Boards. Funds provide direct financial support to those who serve the church and are facing financial difficulties. Active and retired clergy, lay employees, and their surviving spouses may be eligible for the Supplementation of Small Annuities, Supplementation of Health Premiums, Emergency Grants, and/or Christmas "Thank You" gift checks. Many of these workers served before there were adequate pension plans. Now that they are no longer able to serve, they have little money to live on. That's why the Christmas Fund is so important.

In the words of our Conference Minister, Rev. Shana Johnson, "Through your generosity and commitment to supporting Our Church's Wider Mission which completely funds the work of our conference and the special mission offerings we promote in the United Church of Christ, we are able to do so much work and good in our community, both locally and globally. **YOU** are an integral part of the life-giving work of being united in transforming lives through Christ's love. Thank you for being such a powerful witness and blessing."

### **EVENING CIRCLE:**


