Dear Sisters and Brothers of faith,

You might get tired of me sending you meditations from Rev. Cameron Trimble, but I could not pass up sharing this one.

"The strong one is not the one who overcomes others by force, but the one who controls themselves when angry." — Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him), Sahih al-Bukhari

There's a story in the Islamic tradition with a lesson for all of us today.

Each day, a woman would wait for the Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) to walk past her home, and every day, as he passed, she would throw garbage on him. It was not a one-time incident—it was routine. He never responded with anger. He never retaliated. He simply continued on his way.

Then one day, something changed. There was no trash. No shouting. Just silence. Noticing her absence, the Prophet asked after her. He discovered she was ill, too sick to leave her bed. So he went to her home, not to rebuke her, but to check on her. To offer care. To see if she needed anything.

She was astonished by his kindness. Her heart softened. According to tradition, that simple act of mercy began a transformation in her life.

CAMERON'S COMMENTS

The story has become part of the moral imagination of millions. It's not just about kindness. It's about the strength to interrupt cycles of harm. It's about choosing a path of compassion even when justified in doing otherwise.

It's also a cautionary tale for us now.

We are a culture trained to retaliate. We speak of strength in terms of dominance. Our leaders win by demeaning, not by dignifying. Our politics rewards cruelty, and our media monetizes outrage.

But this story offers a different vision of power, one that's deeply spiritual, relational, and subversive. The Prophet's restraint wasn't weakness. It was moral clarity. It came from a place of profound spiritual integrity and a commitment to a justice that does not require vengeance.

This kind of mercy is not passive. It is active, deliberate, and fiercely humane. It invites us to ask:

- · What might change if we met hostility with humanity?
- · What healing could begin if we refused to answer harm with more harm?
- · What strength would we discover if we allowed love to interrupt the cycle?




Poinsettia

Mission Moment

Mission Moment from November 2025

It has been over a year since we had a mission moment about the Open and Affirming Coalition of which our church is a part. It was last year we donated over \$1000 to the Coalition. The Church Council voted to try again this year, and envelopes are in the Narthex to use for donations.

Why we need to support the LGBTQ+ community is explained by the acting executive director of the Coalition, the Rev. Derek Terry. His June 18 declaration was in response to **that** day's U.S Supreme Court decision. Here is Rev. Terry's poignant statement.

"Today's decision by the U.S. Supreme Court to uphold Tennessee's **ban** on gender-affirming care for transgender youth is a moral failure and a heartbreaking injustice. This ruling abandons vulnerable children and their families to the political whims of state governments, disregarding the lived realities, medical consensus, and human dignity of transgender youth.

"As people of faith committed to justice and radical inclusion, the Open and Affirming Coalition of the United Church of Christ grieves this ruling and the harm it inflicts. We reject the idea that any government has the right to deny life-saving, evidence-based healthcare because of a young person's gender identity. We reject a theology that would permit such cruelty. And we reject the misuse of power that seeks to control, erase, and endanger trans lives.

"This decision is not just a legal setback—it is a spiritual wound. Trans and nonbinary youth are beloved children of God, created in the divine image, worthy of care, protection, and the fullness of life. Every attack on their rights is an attack on the sacredness of creation itself.

"We are clear: Our trans and nonbinary siblings are not alone. We will not abandon you. The church, when it is truly living into the Gospel, must stand with the marginalized, defend the oppressed, and speak boldly against unjust laws.

"This ruling does not end the fight. It intensifies our call to action. We call on every Open and Affirming congregation to:

- Create concrete safety plans for supporting trans youth and families.
- Partner with local advocacy groups working on legal, medical, and emotional support.

- Preach and teach boldly that trans lives are sacred.
- **Proclaim without apology** that our faith compels us to resist hatred in all its forms.

"To our transgender and non-binary youth: You are not a political issue. You are not a debate. You are loved, needed, and holy. We see you. We fight for you. We will never stop.

"Let justice roll down. Let love rise up. And let the church be known not for silence, but for sacred resistance."

And I say AMEN!
